3 Steps to Find Your Career Passion

Have you wondered why it's worthwhile to try to find your life and career passion?

There's so much written about it.

Maybe your life isn't so bad. But you have probably had the feeling it could be better. You know something's missing. You can't put your finger on it, but there's an emptiness or a sense of life not being complete or as good as it should be.

But if you've never found your life passion it's hard to know exactly what you're missing.

I do know that finding and living my life passion makes a huge positive difference in my quality of life. Because I'm living my life passion:

- I wake up excited about what the day will bring.
- I love the work I'm doing.
- I have a sense of purpose.
- The day flies by as I lose track of time — I'm in the “flow.”
- I don't sweat the small stuff because I'm so wrapped up in my passion.
- I am happier and more energetic in general.

How can you find your passion and connect with what's meaningful for you?

Wikipedia defines passion as an intense emotion, compelling enthusiasm or desire for anything. Urban Dictionary says it's when you put more energy into something than is required to do it.

These definitions seem one sided. If you were always giving your all, you'd be depleted of energy. Something else is happening. You are actually being fueled by your passion. It gives back as much energy or more than you put in. You are naturally energized by your passion – so you want to do more of it.

Let's look at what passion means when applied to career.

If you are in the right job it's not just about putting energy into your work. Your work is generates energy for you – you get your energy from it.

The process to assess our life and career is rarely easy but especially in midlife, it's healthy and necessary to rediscover and replenish our energy, creativity and passion for life and work.

Most likely you are reading this because you've taken the initial step – you have recognized and acknowledged that it's time to take stock of where you are. You have stepped out of the sidelines and got on the path to search for your life and career passion.

Step 1 - What do you love?

Often when we try to get to the heart of the matter, we're too close for a clear perspective. We tend to narrow our thinking. Using questions seemingly not directly related, we come at it sideways. We're looking to find what fires you up.

Complete the following questions without over thinking the answers. Don't edit your responses. Forget about what you think is possible. Feel free to mix answers from life and work, current or past jobs. Just be completely honest. There is overlap between some questions. Multiple answers are fine.

Step 2 - Why, Why, Why?

Did you enjoy that exercise? It's fun to get reacquainted with what brings joy to our life. Now we're going to take it deeper. This next exercise will be harder but it will actually be more revealing.

When you go about creating a career that energizes and inspires you the problem is that *what* you love to do doesn't tell the whole story. It's just the surface. If you stay here, you'll only look for obvious choices and too often focus on job titles not the substance.

Let's use an example of question #1. Two people say they love to garden in their spare time. However when looking deeper, the reasons are totally different. One person loves the detailed planning and design aspect. The other loves feeling spiritually close to the earth while digging around. The "why" starts uncovering what is unique to you.

It's really about *why* you love it. That's the only way to understand how to bring more of *you* into your work. You need to understand where your energy comes from. Only then can you make conscious, intentional decisions that align what energizes you.

There are 2 ways to approach this step. One way, apply Round 1 to every answer in Step 1. After the entire Round 1 is complete, move on to Round 2 and so on through Round 5. The other way is to apply all the rounds to the first answer until you get through 5 rounds. Then move on to the next answer and perform all the rounds on it and so on until all the answers are analyzed.

Round 1: Pick one answer from above. Ask, "Why do I love this? Why is it so energizing?"

List all the reasons you can think of.

Round 2: Go back to each reason and ask "why?" again.

Round 3: Go back to each reason and ask "why?" again.

Round 4: Keep digging deeper. Don't be tempted to stop until you are at 3 or 4 layers deep.

Step 3 - Your Energy Sparks

Your initial answers may have seemed a bit disparate with only some connection. By peeling back the layers, you'll start seeing common themes in why you love what you love. Recurring reasons will show what your answers have in common. You'll find your core values, motivators, and energizers.

List the common themes:

These are your Energy Sparks. This is what's under what you love to do. This is what energizes you. This view of who you are allows you to look at your career in a new light. Your career perspective shifts and opens up new possibilities. When you think of your career through this lens, the job simply becomes a vehicle for you to experience what energizes and lights you up.

Re-energize or Reinvent

Using your Energy Sparks, evaluate your current job. Do they give it a different perspective? Where in your work do you or can you find your energy?

If you are out of work, evaluate what you just left to understand if finding a new position in the same field would be right for you. Looking at your Sparks may start to reveal a more meaningful and energizing career of field of work for you.

Next Step Forward

You are now in a position of awareness and strength. You know where your passion lies. Now you need to find out how to build it into your career.

In your current job, what is one thing you can do today to enhance or change you current situation?

If you are thinking you need to re-invent your career, you might start your research on the internet. List your initial search words.

Start talking with people about your new ideas. Put the word out there. List at least 2 people to have a conversation with about your new found passion.
